



He has been twice Fairleigh invited to Dickinson University, USA as international visiting faculty and gave public talk to classes and participated in all events during his stay over there. He has, to his credit, more than 2000 articles in print and online media.


and Social Sciences at IIT, Roorkee, focused on the importance of highquality research in achieving SDG goal 4 of quality education and lifelong learning opportunities.






Two Threads of Knowledge
